Pet Owners Must Vaccinate Their Dogs **And Ensure They Get** Their Regular Booster **Shots To Protect Them**

f you have not as yet vaccinated your pet dog, it's high time you did for doctors at the Coimbatore Medical College Hospital (CMCH) say that 20 per cent of dogs that test positive for rabies are pets. Meanwhile, the Tamil Nadu Veterinary and Animal Sciences University say that 40 per cent of the 72 dogs that tested positive for rabies last year were pets. Given these alarming statistics, vaccinating pets should be a prerogative for owners to protect themselves from rabies. Even corporation officials agree that stray dogs alone are not responsible for the spread of rabies.

M Raja Padamanabhan from Kuniamuthur was unfortunate to have lost his pug to rabies two weeks ago, even though he had vaccinated it. The pug had failed to develop immunity to the virus and succumbed to the disease. The pug had come in contact with a stray dog infected with rabies as the servant was taking it for its daily walk.

"Vaccination is a must for pet dogs. Each pet must be vaccinated within 40 days of its birth and boosters must be administered at regular intervals," advices Keerthana George from Help Animal and Rescue Trust, According to her, many pedigreed dogs become susceptible to the disease due to delayed treatment or lack of awareness among owners. Sources in veterinary hospitals say that it is not uncommon for pets to be bitten not only by stray dogs but also by squirrels and rats. Only immediate treatment can protect them

"Even Labradors and German shepherds are vulnerable to rabies. A pet must be vaccinated once a year and its immunity levels must be maintained." says Mini Vasudevan, managing trustee of Humane Animal Society. "Don't give your pets a free reign outside and servants must be sensitized," she added.

"If you have money, its easy to buy a dog. But its safekeeping needs expertise. All family members must be aware about how to protect the health of their pet," says Keerthana. The care less attitude of owners is one of the main reasons for the increasing incidence of rabies in the city. "Many owners are lazy to take their dog for a daily walk. They prefer to let the dog out on its own. This is very dangerous as you will never know if your pet connected with a stray dog with rabies," said a pathologist.

"Dogs have the habit of poking their nose into everything. This might attract the attention of a rabid dog," says Dr Jayaparakash from Chennai's JP

Pet Specialty Hospital.

Doctors said even a vaccinated dog that is attacked by a rabid one needs to be brought in for post-bite vaccine. "Antibodies produced by the vaccine are usually weak and it takes three weeks for the immunity to set in. So it is better to be safe," says Dr Prathapan, dean of Madras Veterinary College.

Sterilisation is key to curb stray dog menace

According to the city corporation, the number of stray dogs in the city has recently exceeded one lakh. Doctors at Coimbatore Medical College Hospital (CMCH) say that they treat 20 to 25 fresh cases daily. Dogs pervade most streets, especially at night, leaving motorists, especially bikers at their mercy. Children are also susceptible to

Corporation commissioner T K Ponnusamy says that they have invested Rs 25 lakh in the centre which is being built on 20 cents of land. They are presently in the process of building sheds and cages. Once construction is completed, its operation will be vested with a city NGO, he added.

Packs of stray dogs can be seen roaming around in most parts of the city including government offices. As it is difficult to identify those infected with rabies, residents panic whenever a street dog apal animal birth control centre proaches them. Cases of dog tal at an advanced stage. bites are on the rise, despite

them," points out N Radhakarishnan, who runs an advertising firm in Gandhipuram.

According to Sivaparakasam, 80 to 120 anti-rabies vaccinations are administered daily at CMCH. As it is the only fully equipped hospital in the city to treat rabies, people have no other choice but to go there for treatment. Doctors at CMCH say that two rabies related deaths were recorded in the last two months at the hospital. Lack of immediate medical care is fatal in such cases. The victims had come to the hospi-

tration and rehabilitation centre at Seeranaicken Playam is not fully active. Its operations could be strengthened by deploving more personnel. The corporation and two NGOs, the Humane Animal society (HAS) and People for Animals (PFA) oversee its operations.

According to a veterinarian involved in the sterilizing process, at least 15,000 stray dogs need to be sterilized in the city annually, but they are able to reach out to only a fraction of them. One corporation officer even admitted that the entire sterilization process was a total According to animal rights waste of money and resources.
